From the Kitchen Nook: Barbequed Vegetables by Rita Pedersen

Ingredients: 1 cup each red and yellow pepper chunks (1-1/2 inch), 1 cup zucchini chunks (1-1/2 inch), 1 cup fresh mushrooms, 1 cup large cherry tomatoes, 1/4 cup Italian dressing, 2 Tbsp. Parmesan Grated Cheese. **Directions:** HEAT barbeque to medium-high heat. COMBINE vegetables and dressing; spoon onto centre of large piece of heavy-duty foil. Fold foil to make packet, leaving room for heat circulation inside. GRILL 8 to 10 minutes or until peppers and zucchini are crisp-tender, turning packet after 4 minutes. CUT slits in foil to release steam before opening packet. Sprinkle vegetable mixture with cheese. Other variations: toss vegetables with 1 Tbsp. pesto along with the dressing. Or sprinkle cooked vegetable mixture with chopped fresh parsley just before serving.

Westbank gets Irrigation Water...the Dawn of a New Era! Part I by Gordon H. Ficke

Following in his father's and brothers' footsteps in law, Edwin Coleman Paynter finished his five-year articling in Alnwyk, Northumberland, England and decided he wanted to explore the vast land of Canada and seek a new life. "Edwin and his wife Margaret visited a former college friend in the Okanagan in 1909," Sheila Paynter recalled. "Henry their son, was only two years old at that time. Edwina, Henry's older sister was four." After living in the Okanagan for several years, the family returned to England where Mr. Paynter served England during World War I. After the war ended in 1918 the Paynter family returned to Canada and purchased a strip of land from Mr. D'aeth. That property extended from Powers Creek to where Butt Road is now.

To earn a living, Edwin and Margaret operated the post office in Westbank. In the good summer weather months, Edwin spent most of his time trudging the back woods and the hills as a water bailiff. At the same time, he was exploring for more sources of water in this very dry Okanagan area. "I think Mr. Paynter had a real interest for outdoor life and had the foresight to realize that people living here were going to need more and more water as time went on," Sheila realized. "That inspired him." While Edwin was in the bush during those summers, Margaret looked after the post office.

With a pack on his back, E.C. Paynter made the 28-mile trek each summer into the chain of mountain lakes that make up the watershed for the Westbank Irrigation District (W.I.D.) that was formed in 1907 and was incorporated as an improvement district on June 15th, 1922. During one of his forays into the bush, Edwin discovered and named Paynter Lake. Mr. Paynter was very familiar with the area's topography as a result of his many visits there. He ascertained that it would be feasible to alter the course of Summit Lake and Bear Lake by digging a ditch and diverting that water to Powers Creek. He proposed the idea to the head of the water bailiffs and he took the suggestion to the head of the provincial water board, under the auspices of B.C.'s Water Act and Draining, Dyking and Development Act. That gentleman stated that it would be impossible to accomplish, but gave Edwin permission to try anyway.

That was all that Paynter needed to begin this monumental task. He gathered his shovels, picks and other tools and loaded them on a packhorse and headed to Summit Lake to begin to dig the first ditch. Edwin's son Henry would often bring

food provisions in by horse back for his father as he laboured during those summers. The second ditch was hand dug from Bear Lake to Powers Creek. Then later he dug the Nicola ditch to Dobbin Lake. Undaunted, Edwin, and sometimes he along with another helper or work crews, accomplished these feats that everyone else doubted could be done. There were times when he and the crew encountered a large boulder or a rock outcropping that had to be blasted using dynamite. But the job was done and much needed water flowed down the flumes to the orchards in Westbank.

Because of Paynter's selfless determination and hard work he always had the Westbank Irrigation District's best interests at heart and because he knew the watershed area so well, he could advise the board as to the best procedure to follow in order to assure a constant and permanent water supply for Westbank's orchardists and residents.
